Message from Dr Craddock

Dear Parents and Carers,

We started our anti-Bullying week in a fun way, celebrating the fact that it is good to be unique by wearing odd socks! There have been lots of rich discussions throughout the whole week that will really encourage all children to think about the kindness of the words that they use and how they affect others.

Children have been encouraged to share how they feel in different situations and being a 'Telling School' they learn how to stand up for themselves if they feel that someone is not treating them kindly. Our Jigsaw PSHE programme helps children to understand different cultures and ways of life better; hopefully getting rid of any future prejudice. From cyber-bullying to playground teasing – we will not tolerate children feeling unhappy and will do everything we can to show children how to behave in a way that is respectful. Having the voice and the confidence to speak out is so important and our children sometimes need help with this. We always act quickly to ensure that any unkind words or actions is never accepted – every child's happiness depends on this.

We are always available to talk with children and their parents and /or carers if things are not as they should be. Please remember to let us know of any incident that has made your child feel unhappy, unsafe or worried so that we can work together to make every day at West Moors Middle School a fun and happy one.

Thank you for your continued help in looking after each other and keeping our school community safe.

Article 2 – Non-discrimination: The Convention applies to every child without discrimination, whatever their ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status, whatever they think or say, whatever their family background.

Article 12 – Respect for the views of the child: Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously. This right applies at all times, for example during immigration proceedings, housing decisions or the child's day-to-day home life.

Article 19 – Protection from violence, abuse and neglect: Governments must do all they can to ensure that children are protected from all forms of violence, abuse, neglect and bad treatment by their parents or anyone else who looks after them. During our weekly assembly, we asked the children, 'Bullying can take many forms. Can you think of and describe some of the ways someone might be bullied?'

During our weekly assembly, we asked the children, 'Bullying can take many forms. Can you think of and describe some of the ways someone might be bullied?

Some of the responses were:

Physical – aggressive or violent action, being pushed, hit, kicked, intimidated.

Verbal – name-calling, threatening, being laughed at, teasing, being shouted at.

Social – being purposefully excluded from plans with your "friends".

Cyber bullying (online, on social media or gaming forums) – unkind comments, sharing photos with negative comments.

Discrimination - against race, nationality, sexuality, faith or another protected characteristic.

Emotional or Psychological – when someone gets what they want by making others feel angry/sad (manipulation) or being told they are not good enough.

As a school, we pride ourselves on being a, 'Telling' School'. This means that if our children see or hear any of the above, or something else that worries them, they must tell an adult. This helps to ensure that bullying does not happen in our school.





The Association for Physical Education provides guidance for all schools regarding the delivery of PE and safety within the sessions. Their guidance states: 'The Association for Physical Education (afPE) strongly recommends the practice of removing all personal effects at the commencement of every lesson to establish a safe working environment. This applies to all ear and body piercings, including retainer and expander earrings.'

As a school we follow this guidance and therefore we must remind all parents/carers and children that for safety reasons, all jewellery (including stud earrings) must be removed for swimming and all P.E. activities. We have been very impressed with all the children who are following this guidance and remembering to leave their earrings at home on PE days.

We appreciate that there may be some occasions when a child forgets or is unable to remove their earrings. On these rare occasions, the child will still participate in the PE lesson (or after school sports club) but we will make adaptations in terms of how the child takes part in the practical aspects of the lesson. We will involve them with group planning, designing and tactical discussions, but they will have different tasks assigned to them during the practical elements of the lesson (for example, individual skills practices, peer coaching, observation and feedback tasks, or officiating in a games context).

Year 6 – Learning how to be safe around the fire and challenging themselves to cross the rope bridge.








Every Thursday after school – Starting on the 25th November – 3:30-4.30

<u>IMPORTANT REMINDERS</u>

Nut-Free School

People who suffer from nut allergies can develop a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. If someone has a nut allergy, it is not just eating nuts that can cause a severe reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product Containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

We cannot have nuts in school in any form.

So please can we ask that you have **no nut products** in the lunch boxes or brought into the school as treats. For example:

Peanut butter sandwiches

Chocolate spreads

Cereal bars

Some granola bars

Cakes that contain nuts

Biscuits / Cookies that contain nuts

Peanut butter cakes

This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely. We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it. We do have to insist we are a nut free school. I know if this was your child you would expect that we all help, especially as it is a life-threatening condition.

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
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
