Rights Respecting News

This week, we are focussing on the right to education. Article 28 of the UNCRC states that all children and young people should have access to education. Article 29 goes on to talk about the goals of that education, to ensure that education supports

children to be the best they can be. In June 2021, the UK government will be holding the G7 presidency, and this means that there will be a summit meeting. One of the priorities for the UK Government is girl's education.

As an RRSA school, we elected to participate in



a project to create a Girls' Education Declaration. This Declaration will set out why girls' education is important, our school's commitment to girls' education, and our calls for action to G7 leaders on girls' education.

This project aims to:

- gender inequality in the UK and girls'
- education around the world; and
- Ensure the UK Government hears from children and young people in the UK on their priorities for action from G7 leaders on girls' education

As part of UNICEF UK's efforts to promote children's voices, we will share the Declarations with UNICEF, these will then be shared with the UK Government, in particular officials from the Foreign, Commonwealth, and Development Office and the Cabinet Office.

This is because pupils now possess a much deeper understanding of their rights and responsibilities, appreciating how they and others deserve to be treated with respect by everyone." "I feel that the children feel they have more of a voice since raising the awareness of RRS." (Mrs. Beavan - Pastoral lead & deputy designated safeguarding lead)


Well done William! You are a superb role model, demonstrating one of our school values which is 'to care'. We are very proud of you.






Learning at Forest School

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

Stationery

Polite reminder to parents that your child needs a named pencil case with pencil, eraser, handwriting pen, whiteboard pen, glue stick, sharpener and colouring pencils in school. Thank you!

Jewellery and nail varnish

A reminder that children are not permitted to wear jewellery or earrings other than studs for those children with pierced ears. During PE, studs will need to be removed or covered with surgical tape. In general terms, you are advised not to allow your child to wear jewellery to school in case of loss, damage or injury. Make up, including nail varnish, is not appropriate in school and should also not be worn.
