

Message from the Head Teacher, Mrs C. Pritchard

We have reached the end of another jam-packed half term and time, as always, has flown by. This half term, however, was particularly busy, with visitors from our link school in France, a visit from Ofsted and exams in all year groups.

As you are aware, we had our Ofsted inspection on 23rd and 24th April. Since then, we have been waiting for our final report to arrive so that we can share the result with you. Unfortunately, we are still not in a position to do so as, despite me chasing (!), we have been informed that Ofsted are very busy at present and are working through a back-log of reports which need 'quality assurance.' So, we will continue to wait patiently for the report to be returned, but will publish as soon as we receive it. I can only say that we are very keen for parents and students to see what Ofsted thought of our school.

Speaking of the inspection, I would like to say a huge thank you to all of the staff, who have worked incredibly hard over the past two years to ensure that our students have attained great results and are happy in school – which was borne out during the two days that the inspectors were with us. I would also like to say an enormous, "Thank you and well done!" to the students who made us extremely proud, as always. I have included below some of the verbal comments made by the inspectors about the students of West Moors Middle:

"We have seen consistently positive attitudes. The students respond quickly to staff instructions and requests. They are happy and well mannered. They get on well together and are extremely positive about the school."

"There are very strong relationships between staff and pupils. Pupils feel safe to take risks in lessons and be wrong. We have seen no low level disruption."

“Students are clear about actions to prevent bullying and individuals have spoken about how the school has supported them in times of difficulty. The children are clear that bullying gets dealt with. The children could talk about what they can do to prevent bullying and keep themselves safe. Any student spoken to about bullying said that the school does something about it. They said that the school looks at why it happens and tries to prevent it.”

“The conduct and behaviour and behaviour for learning is very positive. The students have very good routines. They are delightful – they have excellent manners and I wish I could take some of them with me!”

“The attitude of the students in the whole school is very good. They are very well drilled in routines, getting on and doing stuff. They are very compliant with expectations and have high expectations of themselves. Behaviour is seamless. The students are very positive in their attitudes. They don't misbehave. They are not shy and not afraid to start a conversation.”

“The Year 8 students say they are one big family.”

As you can see, the inspectors were, quite rightly, very complimentary about our students. Again, I am looking forward to publishing the written report, so that parents and students are able to see what the team thought of the whole school!

September:

As stated in the letter sent by the Chair of Governors a couple of weeks ago, I have been offered the headship at Allenbourn Middle School from September this year. While I am choosing to face a new challenge, I am extremely sad to be leaving West Moors, which has been such a huge part of my life for the past five years. I could not have wished for a more fantastic group of students, staff and parents to work with as you all have been.

However, I am absolutely delighted to be able to confirm that we have been successful in securing Mr James Reilly to take over as Headteacher of West Moors Middle School from September 2015. Mr Reilly is currently Acting Headteacher of Allenbourn Middle School and is an extremely capable and experienced leader. Over the past two years, West Moors has worked closely with Allenbourn in terms of staff training and support. Thus, Mr Reilly is already very familiar with our school and has been over to work with staff several times.



I am equally pleased to confirm that Mr Dover will remain at West Moors next year, continuing his work in developing excellence in teaching and learning. I am certain that, working alongside the rest of the staff, Mr Reilly, Mrs Gould and Mr Dover will continue to take the school from strength to strength.

In this newsletter we must also say goodbye and thank you to Mr Witton. Before Easter, Mr Witton secured a job in banking, with J.P. Morgan. This is a sad loss to the teaching profession, but I wish Mr Witton the best of luck in his new career and am sure he will be extremely successful. I also hope that this change of path enables him to spend quality time with his family, especially the new addition when s/he arrives.

After half term, Mrs Hanwell, who currently teaches music in KS3, will be taking Year 7, 8 and 6MW for French. I am very pleased that Mrs Hanwell has recently become available to teach more days and so will be with us for three days a week. She is well qualified to teach languages and so, after an unsettled period in this subject, I'm sure students will enjoy their lessons and make good progress. Mrs Cook will also remain with us after half term, taking some of Mr Witton's classes and accompanying the students to their swimming lessons. I am also hopeful that Mr Malone, following his recent operation, will return after the holidays and wish him a speedy recovery.

African Day

Tuesday 5th May was Africa day for the Year 5s. In the morning, the Year 5s were learning about Ghana and how clothes, school, home life and the environment differ from our own country. After breaktime the pupils were introduced to Cheikh, the African drumming teacher, who taught 5CB and 5BM loud and catchy rhythms on the drums. An outside dance teacher, Lucy Hayter, also included an African dancing activity where the pupils were allowed to dance to the drumming half of the class made.

Forces – Timing how long different sized parachutes took to fall to the ground.






Electricity – The challenge was to build a model lighthouse with a working light & fog horn using our electricity circuit boards, bulbs, buzzers & switches.
